Frequently Asked Questions

How do I participate in the MESH Program?

Complete the enrollment form to indicate your interest in pursuing your MESH Certificate.

Our MESH coordinator will be happy to help you determine the appropriate MESH program that best fits your needs.

What courses apply to the MESH Certificate Program?

All continuing education, non-curriculum safety, health, and environmental courses offered by the Arizona Chapter National Safety Council, the Arizona Department of Safety and Health, and/or Arizona State University OSHA Education Center.

How many credit hours are needed to earn a MESH Certificate?

100 total credit hours with a minimum of 6 hours from each of the MESH sponsors is required. See the course list for how many credit hours are earned for each training subject.

Are credit hours awarded for training completed with providers other than the three MESH Sponsoring Agencies?

Yes, with proper documentation, up to 25 continuing education hours may be accepted from other approved providers. Submissions will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis.

Are there opportunities to earn MESH credit hours for safety, health, or environmental events that are not classes?

The MESH Sponsors recognize the value of related conferences and allow up 7 credit hours for attendance. Examples include the ACNSC Southwest Safety Conference, NSC Safety Congress, and other ASU/OSHA or ADOSH Sponsored events in Arizona.

Is the MESH Program restricted to Arizona residents?

No. MESH Certificates can be earned regardless of residency provided a minimum of 75 training hours are from the Arizona Chapter National Safety Council, ASU OSHA Education Center, or Arizona Department of Occupational Safety & Health.

Is there a time limit for training to still count?

Only documented training completed after August 1, 2018 can be applied. Training must be current and have been completed within a five-year period to qualify. If a training certification expires prior to the completion of the MESH Program, that course(s) must be completed again before being applied towards a MESH Certificate.

What is the cost and how do I get my MESH Certificate?

In addition to course tuition, an administrative fee of \$99 is required to receive the MESH Certificate. This fee is submitted upon completion of the 100 required credit hours. Contact your MESH Coordinator to verify completion of the requirements. You will receive the MESH Program Plaque and Challenge Coin in front of your peers at a designated ceremony after the last required class for the certificate is completed.
